I know this is not everyone's favorite view of what is in your garden, but I'm a retired biology teacher and feel you can save this information and pictures so that you can identify these critters next summer!



The Golden Silk Spider on the other hand is found in a place that is shaded between shrubs or trees, wherever it can find a secure spot.
