"Astronomical spring officially begins at the equinox, which will occur at 5:37 a.m. EST on March 20, 2021, and nearly three weeks after the start of meteorological spring, which, year in and year out, starts on the first day of March."

I know people are set in their ways and therefore I offer no apology; I'm just happy to be in Spring whichever way one defines it.

Month of MARCH 01-14, <u>All</u> temperature Measurements taken at solar noon (1230 EST).

PRECIPITATION

Average March Precipitation for Vermont = 2.2 inches.

Total precipitation for the first two weeks was 0.4 mm or 0.02 inches. This is about a 2.18 deficit that will have to be made up in the last two weeks of the month.

Overcast Days: We had 4-5 days, of overcast skies. Of those overcast skies 1 day produced wind-blown almost unmeasurable light snow.
