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Medicine

My task is to be a window to the world of Medicine and Medical science. For starters, here is an excellent source for all sorts of Vermont health information:

<u>Vermont Department of Health (healthvermont.gov)</u> and in particular, its subcategory

COVID-19 | Vermont Department of Health (healthvermont.gov), which contains details on the current status of the COVID-19 epidemic in Vermont. It is reasonably accessible – and packed with information.

For example, it contains one chart in particular that should be of interest to all of us. It is called the "Progress to zero", i.e. what sort of progress are we making on eliminating new COVID cases? It does not show our rate of new disease, but rather the weekly rate at which that rate is changing.

I will not go into how it is calculated. What you need to know is on the day I write this, CDC, correctly states that Vermont's rate of deaths per 100,000 is significantly lower than either North or South Dakota. However, on the same day, our "Progress to Zero" is 30% while the Dakotas both stand at 37%, 7% better than us. What does this Tell us? Simply this: COVID is here and expanding in the same rapid way as it has elsewhere. So, it is up to us – through our own behavior – to slow it down.

Next issue I will talk about vaccines, at which time I predict we will know more than we do now.

Taste in music is very personal. I am partial to classical music, but enjoy all forms - jazz, country, folk, etc. and would welcome suggestions for any music you enjoy.

a) Schubert's Fantasie in F for piano 4 hands is a favorite of mine, and there are several good recordings on YouTube.

Go to YouTube and type in the title above. Then click on the recording by Maria Joao Peres and Ricardo Castro. It should be among the first on the list of recordings.

b) For peaceful, restorative music, Beethoven's Symphony #6, the Pastoral, is a good choice.

The recording by the Deutsche Kammerphilharmonie Bremen with Paavo Jarvi conducting is fun to watch, and it's wonderful "feel good" music.

c) With Christmas approaching, and for those who good choral music, "Google" Voces 8 Foundation to find the 'Live from London Christmas Choral Festival'.

If you buy your own subscription (\$150) you will have access to a whole month of concerts and can listen to them at your convenience.

Approximately 10 years foreign residence – Brazil, Venezuela, Hong Kong, Miami. Retired in 2000.


Moved to Eastview in November 2019 from Rupert, VT.
