NEW ENGLAND ASTER

The late flowering aster, New England Aster, is such a joy to see as it begins to bloom at the end of August. The pinks, lavenders and blues along with the yellows of goldenrod gives us some amazing color as fall begins. New England Aster will continue to bloom through late September into early October.

At this time of year, it is such a pleasure to have such striking color bursting out from not only gardens, but also from meadows, thickets and stream banks. The aster will grow from three to six feet tall and is fairly upright with full growth. I do have New England Aster in the garden that has not always been upright, but at least it does try to be!

Some may ask is this plant invasive. According to the internet, it is not. Moreover, if we were to look around our landscape, we would not see large fields of New England Aster, a sign it is not an invasive plant!

GOLDENROD

At this time of the year the field/meadow across from Deer Meadow Drive comes alive with yellow flowering species of goldenrod. Goldenrod because of its splash of color at the same time that Ragweed is in bloom seems to get maligned as the culprit by hay-fever suffers. But in fact, it is Ragweed, not Goldenrod that causes the sneezing fits in humans.

In New England there are greater than 20 species of goldenrod and over 100 species in North America.

In Vermont there are 11 species of Goldenrod that are sold commercially; most are considered hybrids. Most of these species also grow natively throughout the landscape. The most popular are 'Golden Fleece' and 'Fireworks.' 'Fireworks' is a hybrid of Roughstemmed Goldenrod.
